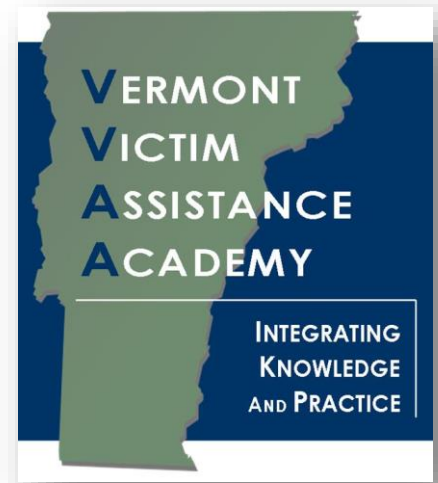

Thank you for your interest in Vermont’s Victim Assistance Academy, a learning opportunity provided by the Vermont Center for Crime Victim Services. **Please read through the following information before you apply to help make sure this opportunity is the right fit for your goals.**

MISSION:

The Vermont Victim Assistance Academy (VVAA) is an introductory educational opportunity designed to improve the quality and consistency of victims’ services in Vermont. The VVAA integrates core concepts and best practices that encourage a victim-centered, multidisciplinary, collaborative approach to supporting those whose lives have been impacted by crime. By cultivating participants’ knowledge, skills and attitudes, we build the capacity of our community to recognize, respect and respond to the needs and experiences of crime victims in our state.

ABOUT:

The VVAA is a comprehensive, foundation-level course on victims' rights, services, and their experience of crime and its aftermath. The VVAA is a practical, interactive training presented by seasoned professionals from a variety of fields. It is open to those whose work and lives intersect with victims and survivors of crime.

Dates

The VVAA consists of 64 hours of guided instruction — or eight, 8-hour days. It is broken into four, 2-day sessions from November 2018 to May 2019. Participants are required to attend the program in full.

Session I: Thursday, November 29 & Friday, November 30, 2018 from 8:30 am-4:30 pm

Session II: Thursday, January 17 & Friday, January 18, 2019 from 8:30 am-4:30 pm

Session III: Thursday, March 21 & Friday, March 22, 2019 from 8:30 am-4:30 pm

Session IV: Monday, May 13 & Tuesday, May 14, 2019 from 8:30 am-4:30 pm

EDUCATION CREDITS and CREDENTIALS:

Every participant of the Vermont Victim Assistance Academy will receive a Certificate of Completion at the close of the final session. Additionally, participants are eligible to receive credit from the following entities:

FEES:

The Center for Crime Victim Services offers this educational opportunity with funding from the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA). Transportation and accommodation costs are the responsibility of the participant.

Total Course Fee per Student: \$250

Course fees support us in developing curriculum, preparing quality materials and providing morning refreshments.

- **\$50 – Confirmation of Enrollment** – This amount is nonrefundable and due upon notification of acceptance to the program in order to hold your place.
- **\$200 – Program Costs** – This amount is due upon arrival at Session I (November 28, 2018) and *may* be refundable (see Refund Policy below).

NOTE: Students participating for course credit (VT State Colleges) are not eligible for a course fee waiver and there is an additional administrative fee of \$100 per credit.

Course Fee Waiver:

Each participant must pay the nonrefundable Confirmation of Enrollment amount of \$50 in order to reserve a place in the VVAA. Waivers are available for those who are unable to pay the remaining course fee of \$200, either partially or in full. To request a course fee waiver, please answer the related questions included in the participant application.

Refund Policy:

Refunds are available for remaining, unattended Sessions if requested up to completion of the 4th session. The refund amount would correspond to the number of unattended sessions at \$50/session. The refund amount would *not* include costs associated with sessions already attended. (For example, if refunded is requested after Session I, the total refund amount would be \$150).

PARTICIPANT REQUIREMENTS

All participants of the Vermont Victim Assistance Academy are required to certain commitments, outlined in the **Participant Agreement**. If you are unable to do so, this program may not be the right fit for you. Please be in touch with any questions.
