



Creating BRAVE Space

What are our ideas about how we can all create a safe and respectful atmosphere, while maintaining openness?

How can we navigate times we may feel discomfort because of a differing opinion or a difficult piece of content?

SAFE Space vs BRAVE Space

SAFE Ground Rules

- Agree to Disagree
- Don't take things personally
- Challenge by Choice
- Respect
- No attacks

BRAVE Ground Rules

- Dialogue: Controversy with Civility
- Own your intentions and your impact
- What keeps you from challenging yourself? When is the choice determined for us by outside factors? Privilege may enable folks to opt out of challenge; and oppression may invalidate an opt out choice.
- Respect looks different for different people.
- Challenges are not attacks.

VVAA 2019/2020 – BRAVE and SAFE Space Guidelines for Learning

- Start and end on time
- Confidentiality
- Ask questions
- Support emotional safety
- Own our intentions and impacts
- Respect looks different for different people
- Challenges are offered & received with the spirit of improvement
- Cell phones: ringers off, for emergencies, when on call
- Focus on learning
- Ask yourself: Why opt in or out?
- Challenge by Choice: Discomfort vs Pain




Attributes of the 2019-2020 VVAA Cohort
